





AWARDS QUICK FACTS

Since our last reporting period:

- Donors contributed \$410,776 in new award funding, up 42% from 2020
- Donor funded awards provided 59% of all student awards, up 6% from 2020
- Students received \$374,657 in donor support
- In total, 424 students received student awards

Eleven new awards have been established:

- Audain Travel Scholarship – annual award for a BFA or MFA student to travel to destinations of their choice to view and study art works
- Peter Harnetty Graduate Award – scholarship endowment for graduate students
- Peter Harnetty Undergraduate Award – scholarship endowment for undergraduate students
- Indigenous, Black, and People of Colour Bursary – annual bursaries for students who identify as Indigenous, Black, and People of Colour
- Shawn Larsen Memorial Award – annual bursary for Indigenous students established by Shawn’s family and friends
- Native Northwest Reconciliation Fund Aboriginal Awards – two annual Aboriginal Awards for Indigenous students
- Hitoshi Nishi Painting Scholarship – annual undergraduate painting scholarship established through a bequest
- Geoff Rees Memorial Fund – annual bursaries and graduate scholarships in memory of retired faculty, Geoff Rees, established by Geoff Rees’ sister
- (Re)Framing Emergent Practices Interim Thesis Development Award - annual award for Master of Design (MDes) students emergent design practice + scholarly work at ECU
- (Re)Framing Emerging Scholars Award – annual award for MDes students emergent design practice + scholarly work and wish to sustain engagement with established research centres or research faculty at ECU
- Jasbir Singh Grewal Memorial Bursary – annual bursary for students who identify as Indigenous, Black, and People of Colour
