

Depending on how you plan to use the projector, you may need to obtain additional components.

Note: To connect a Mac that does not include a compatible HDMI output port, you need to obtain an adapter that allows you to connect to the HDMI port on the projector. Contact Apple for compatible HDMI adapter options. To connect a smartphone or tablet, you may need to obtain an adapter that allows you to connect to the projector. This allows you to mirror your smartphone or tablet screens, watch movies, and more. Contact your device manufacturer for compatible adapter options.

Note: The projector's HDMI port does not support MHL.



Warning: While projecting, do not put your face or hands near the air exhaust vents, and do not place objects that may become warped or damaged by heat near the vents. Hot air from the air exhaust vents could cause burns or other injuries, or warping of projector parts.



Projector Placement

You can place the projector on almost any flat surface to project an image.

You can also install the projector in a ceiling mount or on a floor stand if you want to use it in a fixed location.

There is no vertical or horizontal limit to how the projector can be installed.

Keep these considerations in mind as you select a projector location:

- Place the projector on a sturdy, level surface or install it using a compatible mount.
- Leave plenty of space around and under the projector for ventilation, and do not place it on top of or next to anything that could block the vents.
- Place the projector parallel to the screen.
- Position the projector within reach of a grounded electrical outlet or extension cord.

Projection Distance

The distance at which you place the projector from the screen determines the approximate size of the image. The image size increases the farther the projector is from the screen, but can vary depending on the zoom factor, aspect ratio, and other settings.

Use the tables here to determine approximately how far to place the projector from the screen based on the size of the projected image. (Conversion figures may have been rounded up or down.) You can also use the Projection Distance Calculator here (U.S.), here (Canada), or here (Caribbean).



Connecting the Streaming Device


You can connect the streaming device included with your projector to the projector's HDMI port. Connecting the USB power cable provides power to the streaming device.

Note: To use video-on-demand or Android TV features through the streaming device, you must first pair the projector remote control to the projector.


1. Remove the rear cover from the projector.




2. Open the USB power cable clamp.



3. Connect the streaming device to the projector's HDMI extension cable.




4. Connect the USB power cable to the streaming device's USB power port and fit the device securely inside the projector.




Caution: Do not force the streaming device into the projector; you may damage the projector and/or the device.

5. Make sure the device is securely connected as shown. Pass the USB power cable through the cable clamp, then close the cable clamp to secure the cable.



6. Replace the rear cover and push it into place.


Connecting to an HDMI Video Source

If your video source has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an HDMI cable. The video source's sound is output to the projector's speaker.


Note: You can also connect a computer or laptop to the projector using an HDMI cable.

Caution: Do not turn on the video source before connecting it to the projector; otherwise, you may damage the projector.


1. Remove the rear cover from the projector.




- 2. Connect one end of an HDMI cable to your video source's HDMI port.
- 3. Connect the other end of the HDMI cable to the projector's HDMI extension cable.



4. Pass the HDMI cable through the cable path as shown.



5. Replace the rear cover and push it into place.


Controlling the Volume with the Volume Buttons

Connecting Headphones


You can connect headphones to the projector's audio out port. You can control the volume using the projector remote control.

Note: The projector's audio out port only supports 3.5mm stereo headphones. If you use any other type of headphones, audio may not be output normally.

1. Open the audio out port cover.



2. Insert the headphone jack into the audio out port.





Connecting to a Bluetooth Audio Device

You can connect your projector to Bluetooth audio devices such as speakers or headphones to output audio from a streaming device or other video source connected to the projector.

Note: The Bluetooth audio device must be A2DP compliant. There may be a slight delay in audio output. Bluetooth audio devices are not supported in some countries and regions.

- 1. Turn on the projector.
- 2. Press and hold the menu button on the projector remote control for about three seconds to display the **Bluetooth** menu.



- 3. Press the arrow buttons on the projector remote control to select the **Bluetooth Audio** setting and press **Enter**.
- 4. Select **On** and press **Enter**.
- 5. Make sure the Bluetooth audio device you want to connect to is in pairing or discovery mode (see your Bluetooth audio device manual for details).
- 6. Select **Search Bluetooth Device** and press **Enter** to display a list of available devices.
- 7. Select the device you want to connect to and press **Enter**.
- 8. Press the ✓ menu button to exit the menu or the → return button to return to the previous screen.

The next time you turn on the projector, the last connected device is automatically connected. To change the connected device, repeat these steps.



Installing Batteries in the Remote Control


The remote control uses the two AAA batteries that came with the projector.

Caution: Use only the type of batteries specified in this manual. Do not install batteries of different types, or mix new and old batteries.

1. Remove the battery cover.

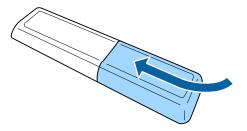


2. Insert the batteries with the + and – ends facing as shown.



Warning: Make sure the batteries are inserted in the correct positions. If the batteries are not inserted correctly, they could explode or leak, causing a fire, injury, or damage to the product.

3. Replace the battery cover and press it down until it clicks into place.



Warning: Dispose of used batteries according to local regulations. Do not expose batteries to heat or flame. Keep batteries out of the reach of children; they are choking hazards and are very dangerous if swallowed.


Controlling the Volume with the Volume Buttons

Turning On the Projector

Turn on the projector before you turn on the video source you want to use.

Caution: Do not turn on the video source before connecting it to the projector; otherwise, you may damage the projector.

1. Connect the power cord to the projector's power inlet.



2. Plug the power cord into an electrical outlet.

Note: If the Direct Power On setting is turned on, the projector turns on as soon as you plug it in.

3. Press the \circlearrowleft power button on the projector or the projector remote control to turn on the projector. The status light flashes blue as the projector warms up. After about 30 seconds, the status light stops flashing and turns blue.

Warning: Never look into the projector lens when the laser is on. This can damage your eyes and is especially dangerous for children and pets.

Caution: Make sure no objects are blocking the light from the projector lens. Objects blocking the lens for an extended time can melt and light that is reflected back into the lens can cause the projector to malfunction.

The Welcome Guide is displayed the first time you turn on the projector. To display the guide again, press the $\checkmark \equiv$ menu button on the projector remote control and select **Settings > Display > Welcome Guide**.

Turning Off the Projector

Turn off the projector after use.

Note: Turn off this product when not in use to prolong the life of the projector. Laser life will vary depending upon mode selected, environmental conditions, and usage. Brightness decreases over time.

1. Press the \circlearrowleft power button on the projector or the projector remote control. The projector displays a shutdown confirmation screen.



2. Press the \circlearrowleft power button again. (To leave it on, press any other button.)

The laser turns off and the status light turns off.


Caution: Do not turn the projector on immediately after turning it off. Turning the projector on and off frequently may shorten the life of the laser.

3. To transport or store the projector, make sure the \circlearrowleft power light is blue (but not flashing) and the status light is off, then unplug the power cord.

Remote Control Operation

The remote control lets you control the projector from almost anywhere in the room, up to 16.4 feet (5 m) away. You can point it at the front or back of the projector.

Note: Avoid using the remote control in conditions with bright fluorescent lights or in direct sunlight, or the projector may not respond to commands. If you will not use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.

Pairing the Projector Remote Control

To use Android TV and video-on-demand features, you must pair the projector remote control with the projector.

Note: When you first turn on the projector, instructions for pairing the projector remote control are displayed on the screen.

- 1. Turn on the projector.
- 2. Press and hold the \(\sigma\) home and **Enter** buttons on the projector remote control until the command light on the remote control starts blinking.

A message appears on the screen when the projector remote control is paired.



Selecting the Language for the Projector Menus

If you want to view the projector's menus and messages in another language, you can change the Language setting.

- 1. Turn on the projector.
- 2. Press the **=** menu button on the projector remote control.
- 3. Press the arrow buttons to select the **Settings** menu and press **Enter**.



- 4. Select the **Language** setting and press **Enter**.
- 5. Select the language you want to use and press **Enter**.
- 6. Press the ✓ menu button to exit the menu or the つ return button to return to the previous screen.

Projection Modes

Depending on how you positioned the projector, you may need to change the projection mode so your images project correctly.

- Front (default setting) lets you project from a table in front of the screen or onto the ceiling.
- Front/Upside Down flips the image over top-to-bottom to project upside-down from a ceiling or wall
 mount.
- **Rear** flips the image horizontally to project from behind a translucent screen.
- Rear/Upside Down flips the image over top-to-bottom and horizontally to project from the ceiling and behind a translucent screen.


Changing the Projection Mode Using the Menus

You can change the projection mode to flip the image over top-to-bottom and/or left-to-right using the projector menus.

Note: You can also press and hold the \(\frac{\text{N}}{\text{N}} \) A/V mute button on the projector remote control for about 6 seconds to flip the image upside-down.

- 1. Turn on the projector and display an image.
- 2. Press the **=** menu button on the projector remote control.

3. Press the arrow buttons to select the **Settings** menu and press **Enter**.



- 4. Select the **Installation** setting and press **Enter**.
- 5. Select the **Projection** setting and press **Enter**.
- 6. Select the projection mode you want to use and press Enter.
- 7. Press the **T** menu button to exit the menu or the **T** return button to return to the previous screen.



Adjusting the Image Height

If you are projecting from a table or other flat surface and the image is too high or low, you can adjust the image height using the projector's adjustable foot.

1. Turn on the projector and display an image.

2. Press and hold the foot release lever to extend or retract the front adjustable foot.



Note: You can adjust the position up to 11°.

3. Release the lever to lock the foot when the image is at the position you want. If the projected image is unevenly rectangular, you need to adjust the image shape.

Image Shape

You can project an evenly rectangular image by placing the projector directly in front of the center of the screen and keeping it level. If you place the projector at an angle to the screen, or tilted up or down, or off to the side, you may need to correct the image shape for the best display quality.













Projector Maintenance

Your projector needs little maintenance to keep working at its best.

You may need to clean the projection window periodically, and clean the air filter and air vents to prevent the projector from overheating due to blocked ventilation.

The only parts you should replace are the air filter and remote control batteries. If any other part needs replacing, contact Epson or an authorized Epson servicer.

This projector uses a sealed laser light source which does not need servicing and cannot be replaced.

Warning: Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off and unplug the power cord. Never open any cover on the projector, except as specifically explained in this manual. Dangerous electrical voltages in the projector can injure you severely.

Warning: Do not try to service this product yourself, except as specifically explained in this manual. Refer all other servicing to qualified servicers.

Cleaning the Projection Window Cleaning the Projector Case

Cleaning the Projection Window

Clean the projection window periodically, or whenever you notice dust or smudges on the surface.

• To remove dust or smudges, gently wipe the projection window with lens-cleaning paper.

 To remove stubborn smudges, moisten a soft, lint-free cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the projection window.

Warning: Do not use a lens cleaner that contains flammable gas. The high heat generated by the projector may cause a fire.

Caution: Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue. Do not use glass cleaner or any harsh materials to clean the projection window and do not subject the projection window to any impacts; you may damage it.

Cleaning the Projector Case

Before cleaning the projector case, turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

• To remove dust or dirt, use a soft, dry, lint-free cloth.

 To remove stubborn dirt, use a soft cloth moistened with water and mild soap. Do not spray liquid directly on the projector.

Caution: Do not use wax, alcohol, benzine, paint thinner, or other chemicals to clean the projector case. These can damage the case. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

Air Filter and Vent Maintenance

Regular filter maintenance is important to maintaining your projector. Your Epson projector is designed with an easily accessible, user-replaceable filter to protect your projector and make regular maintenance simple. Filter maintenance intervals will depend on the environment.

If regular maintenance is not performed, your Epson projector will notify you when the temperature inside the projector has reached a high level. Do not wait until this warning appears to maintain your projector filter as prolonged exposure to high temperatures may reduce the life of your projector or laser.

Damage due to the failure to properly maintain the projector or its filter may not be covered by the projector's Limited Warranty.

Cleaning the Air Filter and Vents Replacing the Air Filter



Clean the projector's air filter and vents if they get dusty, or if you see a message telling you to clean them.

1. Turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

2. Gently remove the dust using a small vacuum designed for computers or a very soft brush (such as a paintbrush).



Note: You can remove the air filter to clean both sides. Do not use water or any other solvent to clean the air filter.

Caution: Do not use canned air. The gases may leave a flammable residue or push dust and debris into the projector's optics or other sensitive areas.




- After cleaning the air filter, you see a message telling you to clean or replace it

- 2. Place the projector upside-down on a table.
- 3. Remove the air filter cover.





Replacing the Remote Control Batteries

The remote control uses two AAA manganese or alkaline batteries. Replace the batteries as soon as they run out.

Caution: Use only the type of batteries specified in this manual. Do not install batteries of different types, or mix new and old batteries.


1. Remove the battery cover as shown.



2. Remove the old batteries.

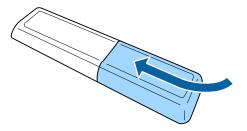
Warning: If the battery fluid has leaked, wipe it away with a soft cloth and avoid getting the fluid on your hands. If it gets on your hands, wash them immediately to avoid injury.

3. Insert the batteries with the + and – ends facing as shown.



Warning: Make sure the batteries are inserted in the correct positions. If the batteries are not inserted correctly, they could explode or leak, causing a fire, injury, or damage to the product.

4. Replace the battery cover and press it down until it clicks into place.



Warning: Dispose of used batteries according to local regulations. Do not expose batteries to heat or flame. Keep batteries out of the reach of children; they are choking hazards and are very dangerous if swallowed.

Transporting the Projector

The projector contains precision parts, some of which are glass. Follow the guidelines here to transport, ship, or store the projector safely.

1. Turn off the projector.

- 2. Make sure the \circlearrowleft power light is blue (but not flashing) and the status light is off, then unplug the power cord.
- 3. Do one of the following:
 - When transporting the projector a long distance or as checked luggage, pack it in a firm box with cushioning around it and mark the box "Fragile."
 - When shipping the projector for repairs, place it in its original packing materials, if possible, or use equivalent materials with cushioning around the projector. Mark the box "Fragile."

Note: Epson shall not be liable for any damages incurred during transportation.



If no image appears, try the following solutions:

- Press the

 A/V mute button on the projector remote control to see if the image was temporarily turned off.
- Check the status lights to confirm the projector is operating normally.
- Make sure all necessary cables are securely connected and the power is on for the projector and connected video sources.
- Try using a shorter HDMI cable.
- Press the projector's power button to wake it from standby or sleep mode. Also see if your connected computer is in sleep mode or displaying a blank screen saver.
- If you are projecting from a streaming device, make sure it is powered by the USB power cable inside
 the projector. Turn on the connected streaming device or video source, and press the play button to
 start a video, if necessary.
- Make sure the connected device meets the HDMI CEC standard. See the documentation supplied
 with the device for more information. If necessary, set the CEC function for the connected device
 again and restart the device. Turn off the projector and the connected streaming device or video
 source, and then turn them back on.

- Make sure the connected device does not require MHL; the projector's HDMI port does not support MHL.
- Turn off the projector and the connected streaming device or video source, and then turn them back on.
- Press the **=** menu button on the projector remote control. If the projector menu displays, there may be a problem with the connected video source, cable connection, or port.
- If you are projecting from a laptop computer, make sure it is set up to display on an external monitor.
- Make sure the computer's display resolution does not exceed the projector's resolution and frequency limits. If necessary, select a different display resolution for your computer. (See your computer manual for details.)
- If the other solutions do not solve the problem, reset all of the projector settings using the options on the **Reset** menu.

If you see the "No Signal" message when you display from a PC laptop, you need to set up the laptop to display on an external monitor.

1. Hold down the laptop's **Fn** key and press the key labeled with a monitor icon or **CRT/LCD**. (See your laptop manual for details.) Wait a few seconds for an image to appear. To display on both the laptop's monitor and the projector, try pressing the same keys again.

Note: On Windows 7 or later, hold down the Windows key and press **P** at the same time, then click **Duplicate**.

- 2. If the same image is not displayed by the laptop and projector, check the Windows **Display** utility to make sure the external monitor port is enabled and extended desktop mode is disabled. (See your computer or Windows manual for instructions.)
- 3. If necessary, check your video card settings and set the multiple display option to **Clone**, **Mirror**, or **Duplicate**.

- Check your computer display settings to disable dual display and set the resolution within the projector's limits. (See your computer manual for details.)
- Check the resolution assigned to your presentation files to see if they are created for a different resolution than you are projecting in. (See your software help for details.)
- Make sure you selected the correct **Projection** setting.

- Check the cables connecting your computer or video source to the projector. They should be:
 - Separated from the power cord to prevent interference
 - Securely connected at both ends

 - No longer than 24 feet (7.3 m) for HDMI cables
- Try decreasing the **Sharpness** setting in the **Image** menu.
- Try adjusting the Noise Reduction or MPEG Noise Reduction setting in the Image menu.
- Select a computer video resolution and refresh rate that are compatible with the projector.

If there is no sound when you expect it or the volume is too low or high, try the following solutions:

- · Adjust the projector's volume settings.
- Press the A/V mute button on the projector remote control to resume video and audio if they were temporarily stopped.

- Check the cable connection between the projector and your video source.
- If you are using a Mac and you do not hear sound from an HDMI source, make sure your Mac supports audio through the HDMI port. If not, you need to connect an audio cable directly to your speaker system.
- HDMI audio is only supported using PCM. Make sure your audio source is set to the PCM setting.
- If you turn the projector on immediately after turning it off, the cooling fans may run at high speed momentarily and cause an unexpected noise. This is normal.

- Select **Search Bluetooth Device** in the **Settings** menu when you pair a Bluetooth audio device for the first time or change to another Bluetooth audio device.
- Make sure the Bluetooth audio device is paired to the projector and not to another device.
- Make sure the Bluetooth audio device that is paired to the projector supports copyright protection (SCMS-T) and A2DP.
- · Check the volume level on the paired Bluetooth audio device.
- Make sure there are no obstacles between the Bluetooth audio device and the projector and that the Bluetooth audio device is within the specified communication distance. Avoid using the projector near wireless networks, microwave ovens, 2.4 GHz cordless phones, or other devices that use the 2.4 GHz frequency band.

If the projector does not come on when you press the power button or it shuts off unexpectedly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the power cord is securely connected to the projector and to a working electrical outlet.
- The projector's buttons may be locked for security. Unlock the buttons or use the projector remote control to turn on the projector.
- If the projector's laser shuts off unexpectedly, it may have entered standby mode after a period of inactivity. Press the power button to wake the projector and adjust the **Sleep Mode** setting to change the sleep interval.
- If the projector is installed on a lighting track, disconnect it from the lighting track and plug it into a power outlet to make sure it is working.
- If the projector's light source shuts off, the status light is flashing blue, and the temp light is orange, the projector has overheated and shut off. Check the solutions for this light status.
- The power cord may be defective. Try another power cord. If that doesn't work, disconnect the cord and contact Epson.

Follow these safety instructions when setting up and using the projector:

1. DISPUTES, BINDING INDIVIDUAL ARBITRATION, AND WAIVER OF CLASS ACTIONS AND CLASS ARBITRATIONS

- 1.1 **Disputes**. The terms of this Section 1 shall apply to all Disputes between you and Epson. The term "Dispute" is meant to have the broadest meaning permissible under law and includes any dispute, claim, controversy or action between you and Epson arising out of or relating to this Agreement, Epson branded products (hardware and including any related software), or other transaction involving you and Epson, whether in contract, warranty, misrepresentation, fraud, tort, intentional tort, statute, regulation, ordinance, or any other legal or equitable basis. "DISPUTE" DOES NOT INCLUDE IP CLAIMS, or more specifically, a claim or cause of action for (a) trademark infringement or dilution, (b) patent infringement, (c) copyright infringement or misuse, or (d) trade secret misappropriation (an "IP Claim"). You and Epson also agree, notwithstanding Section 1.6, that a court, not an arbitrator, may decide if a claim or cause of action is for an IP Claim.
- 1.2 Binding Arbitration. You and Epson agree that all Disputes shall be resolved by binding arbitration according to this Agreement. - 1.3 **Pre-Arbitration Steps and Notice**. Before submitting a claim for arbitration, you and Epson agree to try, for sixty (60) days, to resolve any Dispute informally. If Epson and you do not reach an agreement to resolve the Dispute within the sixty (60) days), you or Epson may commence an arbitration. The Dispute Notice to you will be sent to the most recent address Epson has in its records for you. Notice of the Dispute shall include the sender's name, address and contact information, the facts giving rise to the Dispute, and the relief requested (the "Dispute Notice"). Following receipt of the Dispute Notice, Epson and you agree to act in good faith to resolve the Dispute before commencing arbitration.
- 1.4 **Small Claims Court**. Notwithstanding the foregoing, you may bring an individual action in the small claims court of your state or municipality if the action is within that court's jurisdiction and is pending only in that court.

- 1.5 WAIVER OF CLASS ACTIONS AND CLASS ARBITRATIONS. YOU AND EPSON AGREE THAT EACH PARTY MAY BRING DISPUTES AGAINST THE OTHER PARTY ONLY IN AN INDIVIDUAL CAPACITY, AND NOT AS A PLAINTIFF OR CLASS MEMBER IN ANY CLASS OR REPRESENTATIVE PROCEEDING, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION FEDERAL OR STATE CLASS ACTIONS, OR CLASS ARBITRATIONS. CLASS ACTION LAWSUITS, CLASS-WIDE ARBITRATIONS, PRIVATE ATTORNEY-GENERAL ACTIONS, AND ANY OTHER PROCEEDING WHERE SOMEONE ACTS IN A REPRESENTATIVE CAPACITY ARE NOT ALLOWED. ACCORDINGLY, UNDER THE ARBITRATION PROCEDURES OUTLINED IN THIS SECTION, AN ARBITRATOR SHALL NOT COMBINE OR CONSOLIDATE MORE THAN ONE PARTY'S CLAIMS WITHOUT THE WRITTEN CONSENT OF ALL AFFECTED PARTIES TO AN ARBITRATION PROCEEDING.
- 1.6 **Arbitration Procedure**. If you or Epson commences arbitration, the arbitration shall be governed by the rules of JAMS that are in effect when the arbitration is filed, excluding any rules that permit arbitration on a class or representative basis (the "JAMS Rules"), available at http://www.jamsadr.com or by calling 1-800-352-5267 (U.S. or Canada), or https://www.jamsadr.com/about/ or by calling +1-949-224-1810 (Latin America), and under the rules set forth in this Agreement. All Disputes shall be resolved by a single neutral arbitrator, and both parties shall have a reasonable opportunity to participate in the selection of the arbitrator. The arbitrator is bound by the terms of this Agreement. The arbitrator, and not any federal, state or local court or agency, shall have exclusive authority to resolve all disputes arising out of or relating to the interpretation, applicability, enforceability or formation of this Agreement, including any claim that all or any part of this Agreement is void or voidable. The discovery or exchange of non-privileged information relevant to the Dispute may be allowed during the arbitration.

For Disputes in which you or Epson seeks \$75,000 or less in damages exclusive of attorney's fees and costs, if the arbitrator's decision results in an award to you in an amount greater than Epson's last written offer, if any, to settle the Dispute, Epson will: (i) pay you \$1,000 or the amount of the award, whichever is greater; (ii) pay you twice the amount of your reasonable attorney's fees, if any; and (iii) reimburse you for any expenses (including expert witness fees and costs) that your attorney reasonably accrues for investigating, preparing, and pursuing the Dispute in arbitration. Except as agreed upon by you and Epson in writing, the arbitrator shall determine the amount of fees, costs, and expenses to be paid by Epson pursuant to this Section 1.6d).
- e) Attorney's Fees. Epson will not seek its attorney's fees and expenses for any arbitration commenced involving a Dispute under this Agreement. Your right to attorney's fees and expenses under Section 1.6d) above does not limit your rights to attorney's fees and expenses under applicable law; notwithstanding the foregoing, the arbitrator may not award duplicative awards of attorney's fees and expenses.
- 1.7 Opt-out. You may elect to opt-out (exclude yourself) from the final, binding, individual arbitration procedure and waiver of class and representative proceedings specified in this Agreement by sending a written letter to the Epson Address within thirty (30) days of your assent to this Agreement (including without limitation the purchase, download, installation of the Software or other applicable use of Epson Hardware, products and services) that specifies (i) your name, (ii) your mailing address, and (iii) your request to be excluded from the final, binding individual arbitration procedure and waiver of class and representative proceedings specified in this Section 1. In the event that you opt-out consistent with the procedure set forth above, all other terms shall continue to apply, including the requirement to provide notice prior to litigation.
- 1.8 **Amendments to Section 1**. Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, you and Epson agree that if Epson makes any future amendments to the dispute resolution procedure and class action waiver provisions (other than a change to Epson's address) in this Agreement, Epson will obtain your affirmative assent to the applicable amendment. If you do not affirmatively assent to the applicable amendment, you are agreeing that you will arbitrate any Dispute between the parties in

accordance with the language of this Section 1 (or resolve disputes as provided for in Section 1.7, if you timely elected to opt-out when you first assented to this Agreement).

1.9 Severability. If any provision in this Section 1 is found to be unenforceable, that provision shall be severed with the remainder of this Agreement remaining in full force and effect. The foregoing shall not apply to the prohibition against class or representative actions as provided in Section 1.5. This means that if Section 1.5 is found to be unenforceable, the entire Section 1 (but only Section 1) shall be null and void.

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
